

## ALL HAIL THESE TRUE AMBASSADORS FOR PAN

One of the really gratifying aspects of the occasion that brings us together in this historic celebration is that it so perfectly embodies what has been the Folk Arts Institute's mission. In that it was our desire to examine the evolution of the pan culture in New York, with some of these very elder statesmen of the art form's New York roots, that inspired the idea for this evening's formal salute.

The 1950s saw pan come alive in New York, including a number of important breakthroughs that helped to project the intriguing new musical sound onto America's consciousness. Certainly among the foremost of these significant milestones was the 1954 appearance of a three-piece band in the Broadway musical *House of Flowers*. But there were also appearances in clubs in trendy Greenwich Village as well as elsewhere in Manhattan, a series of weekly Carnegie Hall gigs, steel band's debut at the Apollo and the then highly popular Harry Belafonte's incorporating the steel pan into his touring revue.

How blessed we are that the two surviving members from that *House of Flowers* unit, Michael Alexander and Alfonso Marshall, are included in this Tribute to New York Steel Band Pioneers. How fortunate indeed that we can personally give due acknowledgment and recognition to the other honorees in whose cause we have assembled: Caldera Caraballo, Milton Gabriel, Edward George, Lennox Leverock, Roy Sangster and Kim Wong. And of course to the two cited luminaries no longer with us, Rudolph King and Conrad Mauge, nuff respect.

The Folk Arts Institute considers itself privileged to be leading this hymn of praise to a lineup of extraordinary ambassadors for what truly must be the most awesome of Trinidad and Tobago's surfeit of artistic treasures. And we have been buoyed and are extremely grateful for the wonderful response to our call to have special attention directed to those we have chosen to honor. We feel strongly that any such manifestation of pride in one of the great symbols of our Trinidadian cultural heritage ennobles us beyond measure.
